Following is my Chairpersons Report that was presented at the recent Beyond Blindness AGM and included in our Annual Report 2021-22. This report details our achievements over the past Financial Year as well as providing some insight into future organisational planning and development.

I look forward to 2023 and the opening of our new Client Centre and Admin office at Campbelltown.

We will have many more opportunities to socialise next year, particularly with the arrival of our additional buses, anticipated to be delivered early in the New Year) currently delayed due to world-wide component supply issues).

On behalf of the Board and the entire Beyond Blindness team, I wish you a merry and safe Christmas, and a happy and prosperous New Year.

Chairperson's Report - Beyond Blindness 2021-22 AGM

As Chair of Blind Welfare Association of South Australia (Trading as Beyond blindness), I am very pleased to present the Board's contribution to this year's Annual Report.

The past fiscal year has been highly successful for Beyond Blindness, not only in terms of our operational activity and financial performance, but we have also embarked upon an exciting period of growth and expansion for the next part of our organisational journey, aimed at increasing services for our members and securing our ongoing sustainability.

As we recover from the various restrictions of Covid, our services are now back to normal, but we still must comply with government directions as a Disability Community provider.

A major highlight to our growth and expansion for this year has been the establishment and opening of our Northern office at Gawler. This now gives us the capacity to provide equal access to our services for members across the whole of the metropolitan area and surrounding regional communities.

We have also supported this expansion by increasing our minibus fleet from two to four; one each of which will be located at our Northern and Southern offices, with the remaining two to be based centrally to support our members across the East and West.

We have also increased our property portfolio with the purchase of a new building at

Campbelltown. This two-storey building is currently being outfitted to create a new administration and member activity centre on the lower floor. The first floor will then be offered for commercial lease, this will in-turn provide income to maintain and assist with rental of our Christies Beach and Gawler offices. Following the relocation of our operations to these new premises, The Gilles Plaines site will continue to provide income through the Rental of the onsite units and following discussions with advisors from the Property sector, the office and Social Centre facility is planned to be offered to the market for commercial lease to ensure we maximise the financial return on these assets.

I want to thank my fellow Board members for their dedication, time given and insight to allow Beyond blindness to achieve our vision and goal to reduce the impact of blindness and allow our members to participate in community social activities. Needless to say, we could also not exist or operate successfully without the support of our

wonderful volunteer team, and the generosity of the broader community.

As a South Australian community organisation with a history spanning more than eighty-five years, we remain committed to our mission of supporting independence and inclusion for blind South Australians now and into the future.

### A Message from the Manager

Christmas is upon us once again and I am very much looking forward to catching up with members and volunteers at our numerous Christmas celebration events. Beyond Blindness is again finishing the year in a good position, financially secure and with new activities being run right across the metropolitan region.

Support is now being provided to members living as far as Victor Harbour and the Barossa, facilitated by dedicated staff and volunteers based at our new offices at Christies Beach and Gawler.

Upgrading work is well underway at our new Campbeltown centre; the main building work, installation of solar panels and more carparking is now complete. New fencing, gates and floor coverings are also currently being installed.

With cabinetry installation scheduled for early in the New Year, we are anticipating a possible relocation to the new facility in either February or March, with an official opening shortly thereafter.

In addition to the opening of our new Northern office at Gawler, the year saw the finalisation of our business restructuring plan, reallocating resources from administration to our community services, North, South, East and West of the city. The introduction of new finance and database software, along with a simplification of our volunteer reimbursement process, has all helped to reduce costs.

This, in turn, has enabled the Board to approve an increase to adaptive technology subsidies and no-interest loans to members.

A new guiding skills instructional video was also completed during the year, and the introduction of our regular six weekly overnight bus trips around the state have proven to be immensely popular.

While four new busses have been ordered, unfortunately, we have been at the mercy of international supply and demand. Disappointingly, we have been informed that these buses will now not arrive until the New Year. We very much look forward to their delivery in early 2023.

An exciting New Year beckons for Beyond Blindness with the opening of our new Campbelltown centre and new buses arriving. I will be meeting in early January/February with the board to work on our next strategic plan that will guide our ongoing improvements to our services, subsidies, and social support for all members.

Following our Christmas celebrations, the office will be closing from the 16th of December and reopening on the 16th of January 2023.

I would like to thank all our staff, volunteers, and Board for the outstanding support they have given to members and the organisation throughout 2022 and wish everyone a wonderful Christmas and New Year.

### **Adaptive Tech Corner**

# DOT PAD —TACTILE GRAPHICS DISPLAY FOR PEOPLE WHO ARE BLIND OR VISION IMPAIRED

A new offering from Korean based Dot Incorporation Co, Dot Pad is the first smart tactile graphics display for people who are blind or vision impaired. It can display any visual content from any source because the innovative Dot Image Processing technology uses Artificial Intelligence (AI) to analyse and understand visual input and present it accurately on Dot Pad's tactile display of 2,400 dots.

Dot Incorporation co-founder Ki Kwang Sung (who co-founded the company with Eric Ju Yoon Kim) explains: "In the 21st century, it did not make sense that people who are vision impaired cannot access graphical information in a digital way. There are a lot of innovations out there in every industry, including education, jobs, and social network services... the requirement of graphical information is getting higher, which means that people who are vision impaired are getting cut off. Even in the pandemic situation, remote work and education was mandatory... but they did not have any solution to do that."

Until now, the development of functional tactile graphics devices was hindered by both hardware and software. Conventional tactile devices use piezoelectricity to power their actuators, making them bulky and expensive. Furthermore, translation of a visual image into a tactile one is complex. Simple vectorization or edge detection algorithms are not capable of producing tactile graphics that are suitable for blind users. It requires intelligence to understand what is in an image and decide what is important to the audience.

Dot Pad solves these problems with a combination of innovative hardware and software. At the core of the Dot Pad sits the third generation of the innovative Dot actuator technology. While conventional tactile devices use piezoelectricity to power their actuators, Dot Pad uniquely relies on electromagnetism, which reduces size, weight, power consumption and price by more than ten times. This dramatically increases usability and makes the Dot Pad

affordable for the majority of blind and vision impaired users. While the Dot actuator technology is protected by thirty patents, it is licensed to other manufacturers to give as many people as possible the chance to benefit from it.

It requires intelligence to understand what is in an image and decide what's important to the audience. To create comprehensible tactile content, Dot Pad relies on the innovative Dot Image Processor. It is an AI that was trained with millions of existing visual and tactile graphics, to be able to analyse, understand and segment visual content, and translate it to tactile graphics most suitable for blind users.

Launched in early 2022, Dot Pad has earned huge interest from the media as well as public and private institutions worldwide, with millions of dollars in orders. The Dot Pad technology is even being shared with competitors to give people who are vision impaired all around the world access to tactile graphics.

## A Spotlight On...

## Member – Angela Schiller

Long-term Victor Harbor resident and Beyond Blindness member, Angela Schiller, recently proved that blindness is no barrier to achievement when she was successful in her campaign to be elected to Victor Harbor Local Council during the South Australian Local Government Elections in November. Following is an extract from the media release that launched her campaign

VICTOR HARBOR: The City of Victor Harbor could become the first council in South Australia to have an elected member who is officially blind.

As nominations for the 2022 council elections in South Australia open on August 23, among the first to announce an intention to run is disability advocate and Victor Harbor resident Angela Schiller.

Angela, who has been blind from birth, has been providing a voice for people living with a disability locally, state-wide and nationally and is running with the unexpected slogan "Seeing things differently".

She has held roles with Disability Elders of All Ages (DEAA), Queensland Disability Network (QDN), the Royal Society for the Blind (RSB) and the Guide Dogs Consumer Reference Group, as well as being part of the City of Victor Harbor's Disability Access and Inclusion Advisory Committee for more than 10 years and being a representative on state and regional Local Government Association committees. The roles have covered advocacy, advice and also training and assistance with the development of adaptive technology.

She sees an elected member role as a chance to provide a better disability voice in local decisions, as well as showing that people with a vision impairment have much to offer.

"My lived experience of disability, using many of the community services provided by the council, will provide unique insights to help shape a more-inclusive Victor Harbor community," Angela said.

"With more than 30 per cent of our community identifying as living with a disability, according to the latest Census figures, it is important they have a voice at local government level who understands their challenges and their dreams for the city.

But Angela's interests go beyond disability too.

"My background in primary industry, as a small business owner and a mother will also give me greater scope for understanding the local needs of ratepayers and residents generally beyond those living with a disability." Having recently battled and survived breast cancer, Angela is confident in overcoming any challenges if elected in November.

"I've been through a lot in my life and always been able to adapt and contribute through finding alternative ways to tackle the issue, so my approach to being on council would be no different. I live by the motto where there's a will there's a way.

"I've confidently used adaptive technology to read documents, emails, messages and websites, as well as manage tasks and calendar appointments throughout my years serving on committees at local, state and national level," she said.

"I'll have Oreo (her guide dog) by my side, but other than that I intend to be able to operate independently and not have barriers to being a valuable part of the next term's council.

"As someone without the sense of sight it means I have more focus on listening to people which I believe is an important trait for anyone in government. You don't have to be able to physically see someone to listen, understand and voice their views."

Some of the issues Angela wants to bring to the role include practical planning to enable better access to services and transport, affordable and accessible housing options, youth engagement and an even greater focus on positive ageing, particularly given the age demographic of the local community.

### A Spotlight On...

### **Volunteer – Hedy Hendricks**

Long-term volunteer, Hedy Hendricks, who celebrated her seventyninth birthday at the end of November, shares her story of almost nineteen years with Beyond Blindness. Hedy, who is of British descent, was born in India and immigrated to Australia in 1987.

"I came to Australia on a family reunion visa as my two brothers lived here," she said.

Prior to moving to Australia, Hedy had worked in India for the previous twenty-one years with McMillan publishing.

When she arrived in Australia, she started working in a factory where she was offered an office job in which she worked for over eighteen years.

"In 2004 I started volunteering with the Blind Welfare Association (Beyond Blindness) as well as Saint Vincent De Paul. With Saint Vinnies I would work on Fridays and as a Lavender Lady at the Royal Adelaide Hospital," Hedy said.

When Hedy first joined Beyond Blindness, she would assist members attending the weekly craft group as well as helping in the kitchen and making lunches. Shortly after, she changed her days of work to Mondays and Thursdays.

"On Mondays we would have the Entertainment Group where we would have different entertainers coming to the centre, the Police Band, etc. to entertain the members. We would collect stamps and run raffles to raise money to cover the cost" she said.,

On Thursdays, activities would alternate between outings to places such as different museums and local attractions, and guest speakers from the zoo, galleries and museums coming into the centre to speak with members on topics of interest.

"The best part was that we would meet every Monday and Thursday over coffee and tea with everyone. We would chat and the members would put forward their suggestions for what activities they would like to do. It was like an extended family. We would have a big group of between twenty and twenty-five on Mondays and about sixteen on Thursdays. We were all very close," Hedy said.

Hedy continues to assist Beyond Blindness members every Thursday, as well as volunteering at Saint Vincent De Paul on Fridays.

"On Thursdays I help members, especially the ladies, on their regular outings... My whole heart and love is for the members. Without the volunteers there would be no Beyond Blindness," Hedy remarked.

Along with her two brothers here in Australia, Hedy has six nieces and nephews, five grand nephews and one niece, all of whom she is immensely proud.

Of volunteering at Beyond Blindness, Hedy says, "I get a lot of encouragement because (the members) are so outgoing It's so encouraging to see the members helping and supporting one another despite their own disabilities."

"I would encourage anyone thinking of volunteering at Beyond Blindness, it's giving back to the community. I worked for so long that I want to give something back..."

### **Letters to Santa this Christmas**

Families can mail their letters right up until 2 December. Some Post Offices will also have a floor-standing Santa Mailbox for you to pop your letters into.

As Australia Post Head of Marketing Communications, Corrina says, "We want every child to be able to have the joy of contacting Santa, so this year, our program is open to any form of communication—be it a letter, drawing, song, or photo. In return, kids will receive a response from Santa that suits their accessibility needs, including large font and braille."
