




Beyond Blindness Magazine

From the CEO

2024 is well underway, with activities including the new Tandem cycling group up and running. Our first regional group is planned for April with Frank starting our first Whyalla coffee and chat group.

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Planning is also well underway for the 2024/25 budget and Staff and the Board have also been involved in strategic planning sessions to expand upon our five pillars or priorities, to promote: Independence, Growth, Equability, Good Governance and Member representation.

Some of the ideas our Board strategic planning session identified:

- The need to grow our volunteer base by the recruitment of a Volunteer-dedicated Recruitment Officer.
- Greater involvement in disability expos and events to promote our activities
- Develop links with First Nations Communities
- Establishing sinking funds (putting funding aside) to ensure the organisation covers the future costs of vehicles, building maintenance, and staff entitlements.
- Establishing a member-run group to advocate for the needs of the legally blind community.
- Continue to promote member independence through education and activities.
- Promote independence by use of public transport.
- Simplify our administrative tasks and costs by employing more technology.
- Continue to grow our regional activities by establishing more regional coffee and chat groups.

I am also pleased to report that Jen Musolino has accepted the role of new Northern Coordinator to run and develop activities from our Gawler office. Jen has many years of experience running activities in both the aged and disability sectors across the Northern region. Jen will be commencing with Beyond Blindness on the 8th of April at Campbelltown, before starting at Gawler the following week. Jen will be working Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. I am sure you will join with me in making Jen to feel welcome at Beyond Blindness.

Once again Beyond Blindness maintains its strong financial position. We continue to grow our membership base and with our new facilities, vehicles and with our fantastic team of Volunteers and Staff, Beyond Blindness is in a great position to continue to expand activities for many years to come.

Associate Memberships

We are so appreciative of our Members' partners and supporting network who are reaching out to join as an Associate Member. We also have received an increase in Associate memberships for those with significant vision impairment and low vision and we welcome you to the membership cohort.

The benefit of a Beyond Blindness Associate Membership, offers:

- Access to all our Social Centre's activities across 4 regions in metro Adelaide, friendship groups, and outings
- Participation in special events and celebrations
- 'Eye Contact' newsletter (quarterly) and remain up to date with the efforts and good work undertaken on behalf of our members
- Knowing that your contribution is assisting a worthy organisation

It is worthwhile reminding us all of our Associate Member Policy, particularly as we have seen an increase in requests for carers/support persons and partners seeking access to specific full member benefits, such as transport to our activities. We take this opportunity to outline our Associate Membership policy below:

Associate Member Policy

The Beyond Blindness (BB) full Membership eligibility criteria determines that the person applying for Membership will be legally blind. For those persons that are vision impaired (and not legally blind) or those that wish to support a BB Member as an immediate family member, partner/spouse or carer, BB offers and encourages Associate Membership registration.

<u>Policy:</u> It is the Policy of BB that all persons wishing to participate in BB Social Centre activities, outings, friendship groups and clubs shall be a Member or a currently registered Associate Member.

In order to participate in BB scheduled activities and programs as an Associate Member, the following criteria must be met;

- A person that is Vision Impaired with corrected visual acuity measured between 6/18 and 6/60, and/or with a visual field loss (and not legally blind).
- Be a spouse or partner of the Member.
 Be a registered Carer of the Member they are supporting.
- Be an immediate family Member (son, daughter, sister etc) of the Member they are attending with/ supporting. "Grandfathered" from 1st July 2016.
- Association Memberships shall fall due on 1st July annually.
- Associate Members shall be able to participate in special events and celebrations and receive BB Eye Contact newsletter.
- Associate Members shall not be eligible to access BB Special Purpose Welfare Funds.
- Associate Members shall not be entitled voting rights, as are full Members.
- Associate Members are not provided transport to and from BB activities unless; they are in the vicinity of a Member pick up and there is available room in the BB transport vehicle.
- Associate Members shall pay full price to attend any event that is subsidised.
- Associate Membership shall incur a cost of \$25 per annum effective 1.7.2023.

Tech News

OrCam Read 3 - With new features powered by AI

Just Released- New Model: This newly released OrCam Read 3 is a text-to-speech device you can use anywhere, any time without the need for internet connectivity. It is handheld, pen-sized and lightweight. OrCam Read 3 has



magnifier functions, which, when connected to an iPad or computer can magnify paperwork photos and packaging and read handwriting, much like an electronic magnifier.

For those with low vision, the ability to zoom in on photographs and diagrams while listening to surrounding text and textbooks is an exciting feature. Even people with no vision will enjoy hand-free scanning of documents, and appreciate the powerful AI features. Imagine stepping through the instructions and ingredients in a recipe. It allows the user to follow a highlight moving through the captured text, whilst hearing the document read out loud.

Launch of Tandem Bike Program

Thanks to Blind Sports SA, Beyond Blindness was able to enjoy unlimited loan of 3 Tandem bikes to launch our Tandem Bike Program. Our volunteers collected the bikes and brought them for servicing. Then volunteers Giovanni, Paul and Mario cleared out the shed at Gilles Plains to make room to store the bikes. They also had to dismantle the screen door, and level up the ground to allow for a shuttle door to be installed for better security.

In late February, Beyond Blindness ran our first Tandem Bike activity with 4 bikes at Victoria Park Street Circuit. Volunteers Paul Smith, Ian Simmonds, Robin, Harry, Vince, Member Engagement Officers Jeremy and Marian and support worker Julie acted as pilots cycling with members around the track.

We were happy to have 10 enthusiastic member cyclists participating and patiently waiting their turn on a beautiful spot in the shade on the grass. Some members hadn't been cycling in many years since they were young, and they did really well - I guess you never really forget how to ride a bike! There was also a member that had never ridden a bike before, but they soon picked up the motions quickly. After their workout, it was just a short distance to the onsite The Velo Precinct for lunch.

We would like to thank AusCycling for the generous loan of signages to be placed around Victoria Park, and Kayla from Active City in the City of Adelaide Council for their support in renting the venue for our event. And all the volunteers who assisted as pilots and Stephen Wilson-Shaw, Erwin and Gai Gossert with the logistics in the event. Thank you also to Donna Montes and Paul Murray for their assistance on the Tandem Bike Committee to help get the project off the ground and make the project a success. Appreciation is also extended to experienced tandem cyclist, David Rankin, and Southern Member Engagement Officer, Jeremy Peck, who both guided all the way through to make this Tandem bike activity happen.

Spotlight on Member: Donna Dalling

Donna's life began overseas in 1966, when she was born in Kent, England. Attending a mainstream school and wore glasses due to poor eyesight. From 3 years old to 11 years old, she lived in Zambia, in Africa due to her father's work, living with a chameleon and finding a scorpion in her garden. When Donna was 12 years old, she moved to Australia to start a new adventure, following her uncle who already had settled in the country. Living in Tea Tree Gully, the kangaroos and koalas were different to the wildlife in Africa and quite the novelty to a young Donna.

During her childhood, Donna had only a slight vision impairment, corrected by reading glasses, changing to contact lenses in High School. At age 19 noticing that her vision was changing, and after investigation, she was diagnosed with Axenfeld-Rieger syndrome, which, in her case, had genetic causes. She then began experiencing symptoms of glaucoma after noticing a further decrease in vision. In Year 11 Donna started her first work experience in clerical work, learning shorthand, and typing, which she enjoyed, but it was not suited to her eye conditions.

At age 22 she underwent surgery for the glaucoma to relieve eye pressure. For all of her 20s, Donna worked for St John Ambulance in Eastwood, Adelaide, doing clerical work, answering phones and working in accounts and membership. She enjoyed that role, particularly the companionship and fulfillment of helping other people, being able to assist them on the phone with their issues.

After leaving her clerical role, Donna's time was spent raising 2 children, who also acquired degrees of vision-loss. Donna had more surgery to fix her worsening vision, but she coped as best as she could given the circumstances. At age 45 Donna started a new job in supported employment, packaging and laundry services, and she loved it, doing that job for 10 years until the time had come to move on as the working conditions were no longer suitable.



In 2016, the opportunity arose for Donna to start her own business in massage therapy, Blind Touch Relaxation. It was a way to put her skills to use, as she is sensitive to people's needs, and she loved to see her clients come out from a treatment relaxed and pampered. She offered those services for 7 years deciding to close the business in 2023.

Through word of mouth, she found out about Beyond Blindness at Christies Beach in 2021, and was curious about the activities offered. As other social doors were closing due to her vision loss, Donna wanted to meet other people and make friends. The Beyond Blindness Southern Office opening in late 2021 improved access, and because it was closer to home, it was easier for Donna to participate in the social services within her local area.

It was in April 2022 when Beyond Blindness Southern Member Engagement Officer Jeremy approached Donna to host a craft group in the Christies Beach Social Centre. Donna was immediately keen and accepted the proposal straight away, taking up the challenge. She had lots of craft ideas to offer the group, starting with greeting cards for all occasions. It has now newly been named "Ying & Yang Craft Group."

It's important to Donna to always be open to group feedback, and she wants the crafts that the group makes to be meaningful, and not throwaway, thinking outside the box to offer new activities to keep members always interested and engaged. Some of the craft group's creations so far have been card-making, beading, toilet fizzies, household cleaner, filling the Southern Social Centre with a flowery fragrance. Donna's dear friend Shirley joined the group in June 2022, on hand to give knitting and crotchet advice, and assist with knitting coat hangers and scarves, or anything else the group wants to make. After the craft mornings, the members like to enjoy a lunch together which is a good way to share news, chat and catch up and offer support.

Donna occasionally makes her way up to the Campbelltown Social Centre, and members were lucky to join in on a Pamper Day late last year, with hand massages, nail painting, and lotions being applied, with members feeling refreshed with soft hands and pretty fingernails by the end of the session.

"All of this would not be possible without the volunteers who join in on the crafts, but also offer transportation to and from the centres." Also drawing from her clerical skills, Donna presents her craft group's news in the form of a regular and descriptive newsletter, detailing all the crafts that the members created each month.

She also shares news about ongoing projects, and talks about adaptive equipment, for example, The Colour Star, used to detect colours – surely a useful tool when working with arts and crafts and great for members to know. And any other ideas that Donna comes across that is helpful, she shares with the group.

When not dabbling in crafts, Donna can be found on Youtube with her channel, Crafty Blind Girl Donna, a place to post craft and cooking videos with a vision-impaired focus to encourage people on their journey. Her channel is self-described as "A crafty, well-travelled 50-



something who has lost her vision and is now kicking butt and having fun, with a budgie on the side!" The videos show Donna in her kitchen, whipping up "easy peasy" recipes, like lamingtons, cheesecake, muesli and cookies. In her lamington recipe video, Donna demonstrates how she uses adaptive technology, a Pen Friend, a pen device that will read out labels on containers, to help prevent any ingredient mix-ups while cooking. "Beyond Blindness is a big part of my life, which came along at the right time, when quality of life was starting to elude me. With the social groups and the holiday getaways, I'm looking forward to the trips away. I like them because it's not on a time schedule and everyone is very kind and friendly, especially the volunteers. It's a lot of fun going to op shops and on walks." Despite her worsening eye sight to near complete blindness, her secret is to keep busy. "I'm not focusing on my vision-loss and I'm very grateful to Beyond Blindness for a being a part of my ongoing journey."

Now happily remarried, her husband is also vision-impaired. They provide support to each other through their dual vision-loss. Her budgie Berty, who you might be able to hear chirping and talking in the background of her Youtube videos, is a constant joy, providing lots of love and laughter in their household. Donna is a proud Mum of 2 adult daughters, who are both studying at university. They enjoy going out and attending musicals such as Mary Poppins, and comedians with their Mum.

Donna encourages members to take advantage of what is offered at Beyond Blindness, "to enhance their lives, as it has done for me. It might just give you the support that you need and a purpose. Aside from making all kinds of crafts we also support one another and share skills learnt through life."

Trevor Frost Award 2023 Winner

Adeline Roe was the deserving recipient of the 2023 Trevor Frost Award. 17 year old Adeline was selected due to her talented singing skills. Adeline first started singing when she was 9 years old, learning to play the drums at first, but she always sung a lot at home – pop music on the radio such as Justin Bieber and Beyonce, which her older sister listened to at the time. She also picked up piano when she was 13 years old. Adeline is now a vocalist in her band at school, where they play cover songs. Out of all the instruments she has learnt, she enjoys singing the most, "it expresses a lot of emotion and certain songs are beautiful."

Beyond Blindness Board Member Elisabeth selected Adeline based on her desire to continue her vocal training and her passion for performing. "I also based my decision on the comments of her teacher regarding Adeline's mastery of



technique and dedication to practice. Her teacher was quite detailed in her comments on Adeline's ability to perform and interpret music in a way that is personal to her. As a vocalist myself, I understand the importance of being able to adapt a piece of music to suit the voice of the performer. This is a skill that takes quite a lot of time and persistence to learn."

Adeline plans to spend the prize money on private singing lessons to improve her skills, and perhaps a new microphone, PA system and keyboard. In the future she would like to work in the music sector in some way, writing music and singing. Adeline also hopes to join a band with her friends.

Adeline was very happy to win the award, feeling excited: "It's an honour and a privilege to win this wonderful award that helps many young people like myself."

Trevor Frost Award

Beyond Blindness (Blind Welfare Association of SA) established an annual award to assist a young South Australian with a vision impairment to further develop their skills in music or the performing arts. The award has been named in honour of the late Trevor Frost. Trevor used his own personal experience with vision loss and his passion to help others. He assisted many newly vision-impaired South Australians with support and advice through his wonderful work at the Low Vision Centre and this is recognised in the naming of this award after him.

The purpose of the award is to recognise the potential of a current vision impaired student in the field of Music or Performing Arts and assist them to further achieve their potential through the provision of a grant of \$2,000 to be used for additional tutoring or the purchase of musical instruments or equipment. Eligibility criteria applies.

Tech News: 'See Me' App



A new app trial has been released to ensure that passengers are no longer overlooked at bus stops. Beyond Blindness member, and Adelaide-based Programmer at SAGE Automation, Cassie Hames, created the app to improve accessibility and visibility, as she found it frustrating when buses would drive straight past her while waiting at a stop. "As a frequent public transport user, I wanted to develop a solution that increases accessibility for all people so that everyone can feel comfortable, confident, and safe catching the bus."

The See Me app enables passengers to alert bus drivers of their presence at a stop without the traditional physical hailing. The app interacts with the bus's onboard system, notifying drivers when a passenger is waiting. It also sends spoken, visual, and haptic notifications to passengers as the bus approaches their pick-up and drop-off points. This development is not just about convenience; it's a tool for empowerment, ensuring that everyone, regardless of their ability, can use public transport safely and independently. 'See Me' helps to eliminate the fear of missing stops and supports users in navigating their journeys with confidence.

The See Me app commenced a six-month trial on Monday 5th February 2024 on the 99A and 99C free City Connector services, available in the Adelaide CBD from Monday to Friday. As of Monday 26th February 2024, the trial has been extended to include the 98A and 98C free City Connector services which operate seven days a week.



Books

The first thing Nicola thought when she heard the words 'brain tumour', was 'why me?' What followed was a complete life change, swapping a career and social life for hospitals and surgery. After constant hurdles and complications, Nicola learnt to appreciate each day and the importance of living life to the fullest. Positivity and support from friends and family helped her confront this huge challenge.

Nicola launched her book, "Can't Get You OUT of My Head" in 2015 and she is keen to let you know that it is now available to borrow for free as an audio recording from the Vision Australia Library.

Nicola says, "When it was first released, I gave a talk at Beyond Blindness about it and some members purchased it, but now if they want to read it, they can borrow it. The book outlines how I lost my sight when I was having my fourth operation of removing a tumour on my pituitary gland and my optic nerve was cut, so I woke up totally blind!! As you can imagine, this has completely changed my life, especially with my career as I use to be a high school teacher!! I've also had to adjust my home life so that I can still live independently."

Whole Orange Cake

Ingredients

1 whole orange, skin and all 180g melted butter 3 eggs 1 cup castor sugar 1 ½ cups self-raising flour

Icing

2 ½ cups icing sugar2 tablespoons melted butterOrange juice and zest

<u>Method</u>

Pre heat oven to 180C. Grease and flour a ring tin Process the whole orange until well pureed Add all other ingredients and process until well mixed. Bake 35 minutes



Icing

Mix icing sugar, butter and zest and enough orange juice together until icing is of a consistency to run down sides of the cake. Cut orange into quarters and remove excess pith if desired. Try half orange and whole lemon, cook 40 minutes.

As a SATSS member, you can now choose to use up to three vouchers or trips to subsidise high-fare journeys for travel within metropolitan and regional areas.

For fares under \$41, SATSS members may use one voucher or trip. For fares between \$41 and \$81 (inclusive) up to two vouchers or trips may be used. For fares above \$81 three vouchers or trips may be used.

The subsidy applies to the first \$40 of a taxi fare. You must cover the full amount of any fare over the \$40 maximum fare limit, or use another trip entitlement to further discount the fare.
